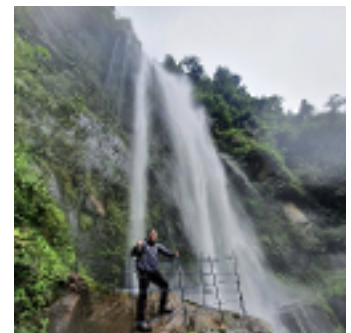
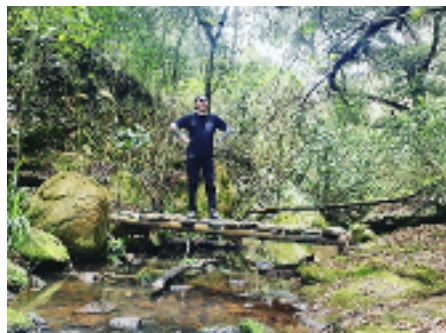
I'm currently out in Colombia, I've attached some pictures! Nothing quite like fieldwork within canyons, the paramo or the rainforest ...

APPRENTICESHIP SUCCESS

Joe Byrne left GSA in Summer 2023. He decided that he did not want to go straight off to university and spent time looking for a suitable apprenticeship route.

'After completing my A-Levels, I managed to get an apprenticeship at Blackheath Primary School. It is a Level 3 TA apprenticeship and I found it via the gov.uk website (thanks to Mrs Dickinson).

Within my apprenticeship, I support children with autism one-to-one. I support one child in the morning and another child in the afternoon. I do this 5 days a week.

In addition to this, I get set one assignment a month which goes towards my qualifications.

Although the apprenticeship has a duration of 2 years, I have been told that I may finish it within a year.

The job can be overwhelming at times as autism is a large spectrum and each child is very different. However, with enough patience and kindness each day can be very rewarding.

My advice to students is do not be scared to not attend university. It can be quite hard knowing exactly what degree and route you want to take. Just remember that with A Levels, you can attend university at any age, you do not have to rush and regret your decision. Give apprenticeships a chance!

*A proud alumni of GSA, **Shakelun Naher** left Salter Sixth in Summer 2016. In her own words, she explains her journey since...*

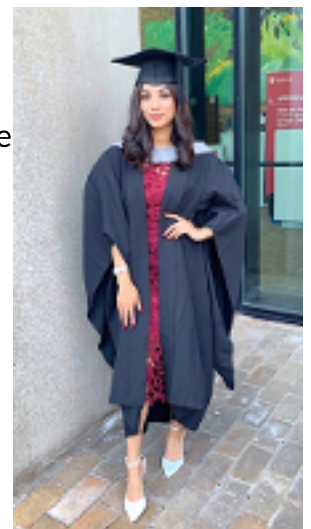
'Post 16 at GSA is a special and unique time for an individual's personal growth. As a young adult, I learned how to be independent and take ownership of my studies. I strove to meet all deadlines, committed to a hardworking ethic and remained thoroughly organised. I believe these skills are invaluable not only to succeed in Post 16 but in life beyond. Since the completion of my academic journey with GSA, my dream was to become an English Teacher. After results day and achieving my desired grades, I was accepted at my first choice, the University of Leicester.

My experience at university was amazing. I met people from diverse backgrounds, experienced new settings/cultures and made lifelong friends who share similar ambitions and goals. At Leicester, I completed a BA Honours in English Literature with English Language. After graduation, I attended the University of Birmingham where I successfully achieved a Postgraduate Diploma in Secondary (English) with Qualified Teacher Status.

Since graduating from both universities, I have taught English for three years. I have been a KS3 Lead teacher/ Second in English and Head of Whole School Literacy. In this role, I worked with a Primary and Secondary School in the West Midlands raising students' attainment in reading, writing and oracy.

During summer 2023, I relocated to the United Arab Emirates as the English Lead for a new British School. I also aspire to complete my Masters in Education with the University of Birmingham Dubai and explore international educational policies.'

SOME TAKEAWAY TIPS FROM GEORGE'S EMPLOYERS' DAY

*Back in April, GSA held an Employers' Day, offering students the opportunity to speak to different professionals about their jobs and routes into their profession. We thought that the information might be useful to all students considering their next steps and **Skaiva Klimisauskaite** kindly volunteered to write a short report for this purpose...*

Employers' Day was a great experience to understand that it does not matter where you come from, there will always be many opportunities to become who you want to become or even become something you did not realise you would become. However, one thing to remember is that regardless of the career you choose to go into, a basic understanding of English and Maths is essential, and most jobs will ask for 5 GCSEs (most of the time being between grades 5-9).

Meeting a construction engagement manager (who also builds F1 cars), someone from Le Grand, a hospital pharmacist, and members from KPMG, it was clear that all had some similarities especially within the best part of their jobs: flexibility, variety of work, meeting new people and inspiring young people like us.

However, these jobs do not come without challenge. Hours may still be long, having to plan travel and having to accept that not everything can always be fixed.

Speaking to members from KPMG, it proves that there are many opportunities within a single company, including a wide variety of apprenticeships in different areas.

Similarly, working for a particular company does not just restrict you to one single area. After speaking to a man from Le Grand, it was clear that although working for a French manufacturing company, he is still able to move locations as it is a global company which has around 35/36,000 employees.

Even going into a health profession, there are still a variety of areas to choose from. For example, a pharmacist can choose to move within 3 different areas: community pharmacist, hospital pharmacist and an industry pharmacist.

Questions also arose concerning what made them go into the jobs they have?

Inspiration for their chosen career paths varied. For some their inspiration was family, but other factors also proved inspirational, such as having done work experience for that career or simply just a personal interest.

Finally, is the importance of your CV. Too many people overthink what to include in their CV. To put it simply, it just needs to be personalised to help you stand out from the rest of the crowd. You will not be the only one applying for that job. The more you stand out, the more likely you are to be noticed. So, as a top tip for writing a CV, add your own personal touch, whatever that may be, but do not over do it. It is as simple as that. Make yourself stand out, but also ensure that your CV is clearly presented.

GSA STUDENT ADVICE TO THOSE MOVING AWAY FROM HOME

- Do your research thoroughly before you choose a university or apprenticeship. Will you be happy?
- Join the University Facebook/ social media pages before you get there.
- Drop a message to someone expressing the same interest for an event, get to know them online a bit before you start university - make some contacts .
- Remember the importance of a work life balance. Meet uni deadlines but fit in that 'me time'. Treat yourself to a movie and a takeaway/ attend the social events put on by your University.
- Try to stay conscious of cost. Not every night needs to be a 'going out night'.
- 'Student Services' will give you advice on practically anything from mental health to social clubs so please use these services, they are fantastic!
- Visit your family or friends over the weekend if time allows, but allow yourself time to settle in before going.

STUDYING LAW AT WARWICK

My name is Amice and I was a student at George Salter and Salter Sixth between 2014 and 2021. After studying History, Law and Film Studies at A-Level, I decided to study Law at the University of Warwick. I am now in my final year and set to graduate in June 2024.

I was initially apprehensive about making new friends and living with others in university accommodation, but I am glad I decided to take up the opportunity. I lived with 7 other people, and we became quite close over the year. I stayed in Lakeside accommodation on my campus. In second year, I benefitted from increased lectures and in my final year I have joined more societies including the Pool Society, Badminton Society and Law Society. I also transferred to a new local Roller Derby League to continue my passion for the sport. I found that putting myself out there and doing things I enjoy was a really easy way to meet people with similar interests and personalities!

Making friends as a young adult can be daunting at first, but I have learned that it's never too late to try new things or make new friends! I struggled with this a bit in my second year but my best advice is to put yourself out there and take on as many opportunities as possible because you can make lifetime friends with great people!

University can be quite costly to say the least, but there are a range of positives that have reassured me that I have made the right decision to attend. As well as the social aspects of university such as going to events, parties, sports and meeting new people, I have also enjoyed gaining a deeper understanding of Law which has made my passion for the subject flourish. If you are passionate about any subject, going to university to study it in more detail opens an infinite number of doors for careers, even if you aren't sure exactly what you want to do with it yet! There are plenty of options and lots of support to help you decide along the way.

Despite all the positives, university can also be quite stressful, and you may feel like you are struggling from time to time. This can happen to anybody, even the 'smartest' or the 'strongest' of us and I'm no stranger to this myself! This is particularly common when coursework and essay deadlines loom or over the exam period. I use a variety of outlets to help me: engaging more in sports and keeping active, socialising with my friends or speaking to the wellbeing team and tutors.

For those of you who are about to leave home for the first time, I would recommend finding out what support services your future university offers because you may need it when you least expect it! I was quite sceptical about this before I went to university, but wellbeing is for everyone and at all times, not just when you're struggling!

From GSA to the NHS

Pranav Chohan left GSA in 2016. He is now a Junior Doctor working within the NHS...

'I joined GSA in 2009 and obtained my GCSEs in 2014. I then went on to join the Salter Sixth Form and finished my A-Levels in 2016. Throughout my 7 years at GSA I always felt supported by the tremendous efforts of all staff and teachers and there was always a high standard of teaching delivered, matched with an expectation of us students to work our hardest to truly maximise our potential.

Working closely alongside the Salter Sixth staff - I successfully applied to study Medicine and Surgery MBChB at the University of Birmingham in 2016 and went on to graduate in 2021.

Since then, I have worked as a junior doctor in the NHS in various specialties including Respiratory wards during the Covid outbreak, A&E during the severe winter pressures and Psychiatry wards, working with patients with both physical and mental health needs.

I am now in the process of applying for GP training as I look to progress in my career beyond a Junior doctor.'
